

## MERCY SECONDARY EDUCATION ASSOCIATION HISTORY

*The first "history" of MSEA was written for the 1990 Proceedings of Conference IX by Sister Judith Heberle, RSM (Rochester). This history was repeated in the Proceedings of Conference X and XI, 1991 and 1992. Subsequently, each year, in the Proceedings of the annual conference, beginning with Conference XII, the history was updated to include the themes, speakers and the highlighted actions of the past year's annual conference. What follows is the original history written by Sister Judith Heberle, RSM. It is followed by the history through Conference XIX. Each MSEA Board contributed to this latter recording of the history.*

It seems appropriate to review the history of MSEA as we approach the date of the tenth anniversary of the Mercy Secondary Education Association and the establishment of the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy.

This history is simply a pulling together of the beginnings - much more could be written. In fact, much more is written because the report of the MSEA Conferences I through VIII are carefully documented and available in unit and Mercy secondary school archives around the country.

The beginnings date back to around **1977** when Sisters Carol Wheeler (Baltimore), Nancy Thompson (Detroit), and Helen Marie Burns (Provincial of the Detroit Province) talked informally about what appeared to them to be the untapped potential for collaboration among Sisters of Mercy and colleagues in the ministry of secondary education.

For the next few years informal conversation continued and at times involved a number of small groups of secondary school administrators. Then, in **June 1981**, at the 150th anniversary celebration of the Sisters of Mercy held in Pittsburgh, Sister Helen Marie Burns invited persons interested in collaboration in secondary education to meet together and 30 or 40 sisters responded and encouraged the endeavor.

Following this, Sisters Helen Marie Burns and Nancy Thompson sent out a questionnaire to congregational and provincial administrators, to schools and to some other individual sisters - and again received encouragement to pursue the endeavor, this time from a somewhat broader-based group.

A steering committee was formed, which met for the first time in **October 1981**, to start planning the first Mercy Secondary Education Conference. Members of this initial Steering Committee were: Sisters Carol Wheeler, Helen Marie Burns, Nancy Thompson, Cathleen Cahill (Chicago), Mary McCarthy (West Hartford), Joanne Mary Boellner (Cincinnati) and Joan Laboon (Pittsburgh).

The first conference was held in **October 1982 at Mercy Center, Farmington Hills, Michigan**. This laid the groundwork for the establishing of the association, which was formally accomplished at the second conference, **October 1983 at Mercy Center, Madison, Connecticut**. The elected members of the first Executive Board and officers were: Sister Carol Wheeler, President; Sister Mary McCarthy (Hartford), Vice President; Sister Cathleen Cahill, Secretary; Sister Nancy Thompson, Treasurer; Members at Large: Sister Amy Bayley (Burlingame), Sister Lourdes Sheehan (Baltimore) and Sister Mary Ann Smith (Baltimore).

At this 1983 conference, the structure and purposes for the association were discussed and unanimously accepted. The purposes as established then continued to be the focus of the Mercy Secondary Education Association:

- to further the Mercy charism In secondary schools;
- to develop a statement of common philosophy and goals;
- to enhance a sense of national identity to provide for collaboration in areas of identified need and/or interest;
- to foster dialogue among RSMs and with others involved in the ministry of secondary education.

Over the years, Executive Board members have carried the responsibility of planning for and implementing the annual conference. It became clear from the beginning that because the Executive Board members were volunteers with other full time commitments, they could not be expected to do much more than plan for the annual conference.

However, it has also become clear that there is much more to be accomplished. There is potential among the members in secondary education ministry that could lead too much greater collaboration and networking. Over the years, major discussions have taken place, indicating a strong need for hiring an Executive Director and/or establishing a national office.

At the **conference in 1984, held at St. Vincent's Academy, Savannah, Georgia**, bylaws were presented and unanimously accepted. The bylaws incorporated the purposes as stated at the 1983 conference. The annual conferences were well accepted by those who attended; networking, collaboration, sharing, and reaching out were all values that were supported. In particular, collaboration with lay women and men co-ministering in Mercy secondary schools strengthened throughout the 1980's. It is to be noted in particular that Ms. Janet Bamberger (Cincinnati) was elected to the Executive Board for the years 1985-1987.

The format of the early conferences consisted of a keynote presentation followed by a number of practical workshops and swapshops. During 1985 and 1986, programs of personal sharing and personal enrichment were introduced and provided for a two- or three-year period. In time, they were dropped, primarily because there was no one or no office to assist in carrying out the implementation of them.

The **1985 conference at Mercy Center, Cincinnati, Ohio** was held in tribute to the late Emily George, RSM The focus on critical thinking and the critical conscience (Mary Brian Costello, RSM, Chicago) as well as on our Mercy tradition in education (Helen Marie Burns, RSM, Mercy Center, Washington) were certainly indicative of Emily's spirit.

During **Conference V at Gwynedd-Mercy College, Gwynedd Valley, Pennsylvania in 1986**, a Mission Statement was presented and adopted unanimously:

The Mercy Secondary Education Association is an organization founded by the Sisters of Mercy to provide a national forum to enhance and further the Mercy charism in secondary education.

Rooted in the tradition of Catherine McAuley, founder of the Sisters of Mercy, it seeks to bond together Sisters of Mercy and their colleagues in the ministry of secondary education.

This educational association fosters the development of value-centered education in the ministry of secondary education in the Roman Catholic tradition, with particular concern for young women and the poor.

The 1986 conference was significant because it focused the entire program on the future: *Mercy Secondary Education: 2001: Where Do We Want To Be?* The workshops as well as the keynote presentations provided opportunities to look toward the future.

Significant events took place at the **1987 Conference VI in Clarkson, Michigan**. Terms of members of the first Executive Board were completed. Sister Carol Wheeler and members of the Executive Board were recognized for their great and generous contribution in establishing MSEA. There was no doubt at this time that infancy years were moving toward maturity for the organization.

In her address to the assembly, Sister Carol Wheeler challenged members of MSEA to the conviction that: "We, as educators in the Mercy tradition, have something exceptional to offer in education at this time," and "that the quality of education we offer could be strengthened by greater collaboration among our schools, by thinking of our schools and the teachers in them as 'connectors,' by being mindful of what is happening in our world - of significant currents, trends, movements, realities" - and "by addressing these issues directly and/or have our awareness of them inform the way we educate." Carol also called attention to "the fact that more and more the future of the Mercy tradition in secondary education will depend on the lay colleagues of the Sisters of Mercy - most of whom are in Mercy schools because they value the tradition."

Also significant to the conference was an excellent panel of lay colleagues described "Sharing Mercy" to the assembly. There was indeed an air of enthusiasm and energy as the lay colleagues shared their convictions of Mercy's charism and traditions.

A report was given by a committee chaired by Sister Corinne Raven (Chicago) on developing a model for a national office. It was clear that this was simply a beginning, as well as a shared hope for the future. Election of officers place: Sister Amy Bayley became the second president of MSEA.

The theme of the **1988 Conference VI in Louisville, Kentucky** was *Mercy Schools In Transition*. The program varied for a change in format from the previous conferences. It provided a keynote address, followed by two different tracks: "Creating an Invitational Image (External Affairs)" and "Creating an Invitational Environment (Internal Affairs)."

During the business meeting, the Executive Board explained that a Mercy Experience Task Force had been formed. The task force was charged with "offering options for addressing the need for immediate and long range programming to assist local educational settings in the understanding and integration of the Mercy charism and tradition." (At this writing, the work of this task force continues.)

Also, at the business meeting, members were asked to identify what would be considered the "most important move, thing, action that MSEA needs to attend to right now." These issues were then addressed by the Executive Board. The two of greatest significance were the work of the Mercy Experience Task Force and the creation of a Task Force on Institute Proposal for Mercy Secondary Education. (The work of this task force is described in Part II of this history.)

At the 1988 conference, Sister Virginia Bertschi (Scranton) was chosen as President-Elect.

*Mercy Education In the Context of the Church* was the theme of the **1989 Conference VIII in Washington, DC**. The keynote address, “The American Catholic Church and Education” set the tone for discussions around implications for Catholic secondary education and the future as well as for discussion around Mercy education values and practical experiences.

The business meeting included major reports for both the Mercy Experience Task Force and the Institute Proposal for Mercy Secondary Education Task Force. An excellent slide presentation “Sharing the Mercy Charism” was presented by Sister Corinne Raven, principal of Mother McAuley High School in Chicago, as part of the Mercy Experience Task Force report.

During these formative years of MSEA, membership has consisted of administrators of Mercy secondary schools, congregational leadership, and individual membership. The number attending the conferences is usually around 110 persons. There has been a strong thrust by the members of the Executive Board to encourage all Mercy secondary schools to become an active part of the organization.

Participation in the conferences to some extent has been dependent on the time and place of the meetings. As already stated, lay presence has most certainly enhanced participation at the conferences. The support of leadership of congregations and provinces has also been encouraged and appreciated. The energies of the members of the executive Board have always been received with much gratitude by members of MSEA.

This history would not be complete without mentioning other significant accomplishments:

1 We have been proud that a number of Mercy secondary schools have received national recognition by being named Exemplary Private Schools by the US Department of Education and the Council for American Private Education.

2. In 1985 a monograph, “Some Lasting Efforts: Mercy Tradition and Secondary Education” by Sister Helen Marie Bums, was published. Sister Helen Marie made this presentation at the 1985 conference. It received wide publicity. Board members, faculty, and parents have read this monograph and learned much about Catherine's charism to educate the young.

3. In 1989 a video was produced: “A Message from Baggot Street – Mercy Values in Education.” The video was produced in collaboration with Mercy College of Detroit. It was financially supported through the Mercy Administrative Team, Mercy Center, Washington, and Mercy College of Detroit. The video was presented initially at the 1989 conference and has been purchased by a significant number of our secondary schools and by congregations and provinces.

From this brief history it is evident that the challenges set forth by Sister Carol Wheeler in 1987 continue to be with the membership of MSEA: “Let us indeed continue the conversation with great diligence and care.”

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*History 1990-1999*

**The conference of 1990 was held in Erie, PA.** *Global Education: A Call to Think and Be in New Ways* provided members an opportunity to reflect on the New Cosmology-to reflect on the 46 “signs of our times.” The keynoter, Jane Blewett, Director of Earth Community Center challenged members at the conference to understand that "there is not a future for our map of the national states unless there is a future for the earth itself."

Workshops continued the theme of the conference: “Curriculum for the New World,” “Conflict Resolution,” “Mercy Vocational Education” and “Exploring Possibilities: International Baccalaureate and Summer Experimental Education for Kids (SEEK).”

At the business meeting two major presentations were made and unanimously accepted by the group culminating the visions and dreams which had been started as early as 1983:

1. The proposal presented by the Institute Education Task Force was unanimously accepted stating: “The Mercy Education Association proposes that the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas establish a structure designed to provide an official relationship among the Mercy secondary schools within the Institute for the purpose of the continuing development of secondary education in the Mercy tradition.”

2. Values that educators in the Mercy tradition held in common were overwhelmingly affirmed.

Mary McCarthy, RSM (Hartford) was chosen as President-Elect.

**The conference of 1991 was a celebration of 10 years of MSEA and was held at Mother McAuley High School in Chicago.** The theme *Caring, Charism and Commitment* provided for presentations given by Amy Hoey, RSM, Institute Councilor and Mary Brian Costello, RSM, a long time friend and member of MSEA.

“Charism, A Gift to be Given” - Amy Hoey's presentation was timely since the Institute had been founded in July 1991. The Mercy Secondary Education Association proposal had been passed on to the Institute Leadership Team. The Direction Statement was certainly a challenge to Mercy educators.

Mary Brian Costello, RSM, presented “A School with Soul” which addressed from the perspective of education, values, and spirituality: "What constitutes the soul of your school?"

Break out sessions addressed “Hospitality,” “Compassion,” “Mission Effectiveness,” “Mercy Student Leadership” and “Making Connections: Teaching and the Human Brain.”

The business meeting included three major reports; an update on the disposition of the MSEA Institute Proposal which had been forwarded to the Institute Leadership Team; progress on the Leadership Development Program and a report of the Development Workshop which was held for 40 members of MSEA prior to the opening of Conference X.

*Some Lasting Efforts* was the theme of **Conference XI held at Mercy Center, Madison**. Sister Patricia McCarthy, CND, keynoted by addressing “Non-Violence: The Call to Go Beyond Justice to Mercy.” Patricia's clear presentation, questions, and challenges set the tone for the entire conference. Workshops were provided which assisted in getting "practical" in Mercy: “Creating Unity Amidst Diversity,” “Spirituality Called Mercy,” “Development,” “Building Self-Esteem in the School,” “Teaching Catherine McAuley.”

Mary Waskowiak, RSM, member of the Institute Leadership Team, presented an update on the MSEA Education Proposal indicating that following several meetings with members of the MSEA Board and others, the Institute Leadership Team gave a unanimous "yes " for the formation and funding of a national education office. This office will include all Mercy-sponsored elementary and secondary schools in the Americas.

Sister Corinne Raven, RSM (Chicago) was chosen as President-Elect.

*Creating and Maintaining Ministering Communities* was the theme of the **1993 conference held in Macon, Georgia at Mount de Sales Academy**, where the members of the MSEA experienced true southern hospitality.

Sister Doris Gottemoeller, President of the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy, was the keynote speaker. Doris' thought-provoking presentation touched on how members of administration, faculty, and staff are called to be united to one another--to have a spirit of belonging--to search for shared identity--to have an understanding of moral authority and to mirror Catherine McAuley who created ministering communities. Her presentation not only challenged members of MSEA as educators, but also provided some practical experience.

Breakout sessions included reflections and suggestions for directions for the newly formed Institute Office of Education to Marla Yeck, RSM, Director. Marla Yeck, RSM listened and responded to the reports provided by the groups.

The accomplishments listed on pages xiv, xv were extended to include:

4. The “Values of Mercy Secondary Education Association” were developed by the entire membership over a two-year period 1989-91. They were printed and promulgated in 1991.

5. The “Mercy Leadership Development Program for Secondary Educators” prepared by the Mercy Experience Task Force chaired by Toni Ann Secrest (Mercy High School, Burlingame, CA,) dated December 1990.

(A note in 1993 recalls: “This history was compiled in 1993 by Sister Judith Heberle, RSM, Rochester one of the founding mothers of MSEA.)

The history continues...

The **1994 Conference XIII convened at Mercy Center, St. Louis, Missouri.** *Creating a Mercy Response* called members to reflect the ways "We witness to mercy when we reverence the dignity of each person, create a spirit of hospitality and pursue integrity of word and deed in our lives." (Const. 8)

The theme was carried out through the weekend and presented by keynoter, Sister Suzanne Elliott (New York) who spoke on "The Needs of Youth--a Profile of Young People Today." Suzanne highlighted four needs emerging from United States culture: the need for peace, the need for relatedness, the need for meaning, and the need for the feminine. A panel of three members then picked up on the themes of "reverencing dignity," "creating hospitality" and "pursuing integrity." Focus groups developed these themes.

During the business meeting, Sister Margaret Dempsey (Brooklyn) was elected President-elect. The business meeting included reports from Sister Marla Yeck, Director of the Institute Office of Education, the establishment of a Mercy Leadership Academy for potential administrators, and the development of a self-assessment tool for Mercy High Schools to be ready for implementation by September 1995. Also, members voted to approach the Mercy Higher Education Colloquium for financial support for qualified graduates of Mercy secondary schools who wish to attend Mercy colleges and universities.

Sharing new ideas, practical suggestions, and networking were an integral part of the conference, which closed with a presentation by Judith Bobber from McAuley High School in Chicago entitled "Mercy Spirituality, the Educator."

**The 1995 conference was co-chaired by Mercy High School, Burlingame which housed the conference and Mercy High School, San Francisco.** The conference theme was *Mercy Secondary Education. What Does It Truly Cost?* Sister Carol Wheeler, Principal of Mercy High School, Baltimore, was the keynote speaker and her all encompassing presentation on the theme presented a mandate to Mercy educators to pass on the charism and tradition of Mercy education during this critical window of opportunity while there are still Sisters of Mercy on boards and faculties. Her presentation was printed in book form and widely distributed.

A panel presentation representing teachers, development, administration, and boards responded to the presentation and the theme. The business meeting included a presentation by Mary Waskiowiak, RSM from the Institute Leadership Team on the future of the Institute Education Office which had been discontinued by the Institute Leadership Conference pending future study. Sister Cathleen Cahill gave a report on the Leadership Academy which was held in June and was tremendously successful. Thirty potential Mercy administrators attended and were prepared to be leaders in Mercy education in the tradition of Catherine McAuley. Three task forces were formed to investigate the possibility of a Mercy Teachers' Institute, Joint PR efforts, and a Mercy Sponsorship Conference.

**Conference XV took place at Our Lady of Mercy Academy in Syosset, New York. It was hosted by that school, Catherine McAuley, Brooklyn, and Mercy High School, Riverhead.** The theme of the conference was *Mercy Educators, Voices That Challenge.*

The Conference was preceded by a meeting on sponsorship which was coordinated by Barbara Wheeley, RSM, from the Baltimore Regional Community Leadership Team. Over fifty representatives from 33 schools gathered to discuss what we could do to form a Mercy Education System. A task force was formed to continue the study.

The meeting opened with a tribute and presentation in honor of Sister Judith Herberle, RSM one of the founding mothers of MSEA who wrote the history and who had played a major role in the Association since its inception. Judith died in the summer of 1996. There were two keynote presentations. Dr. Judith Dorney presented the challenge of "Learning From Girls and Their Teachers: Developing Voices That Challenge." Dr. Lorraine Monroe of Bank Street College challenged us to know what constitutes "Real School." Both presentations left Mercy educators inspired and challenged. Workshops helped the over 400 participants, the largest conference ever, to experience some possible solutions to the "voices that challenge."

At the business meeting, Rosann Fraher, RSM was elected President-Elect. Cathleen Cahill, RSM reported on the Leadership Academy which had been held at St. Joseph's College in Hartford in June. Ms. Terri Hanrahan reported on the Teacher's Institute which took place at Mercyhurst College in June. A suggestion was made to amend the by-laws at the next meeting with regard to the stipulation that the MSEA Board have a majority of Sisters of Mercy.

*"STRENGTHEN MERCY HEARTS...was the theme of the 1997 Conference.* This conference was held at Catherine McAuley High School in Portland, Maine. Sister Edward Mary, Principal, welcomed the 171 participants from 17 states and Belize.

Again, a meeting on sponsorship for Mercy secondary education preceded the conference. Members of the Regional Community Leadership Teams joined with administrators from the high schools to review the process delineated by the Task Force with Susan M. Weber serving as consultant for the study. Susan W'eber was in the process of interviewing principals, presidents, and Regional Leadership presidents/delegates at this time. She gave an explanation of the instrument to be used to generate the profile of Mercy secondary education.

**Conference XVI** opened with a panel reflecting on what touches our Mercy hearts. Candace Anderson, Dotty McCrae, and Pete Cordova shared some of their personal experiences as Mercy educators. Mary Aquin O'Neill, RSM, presented a compelling keynote address: *"Strengthen Your Mercy Heart."* Corinne Raven, RSM, provided a response to the address. This was followed by questions and comments from the membership at large.

The afternoon provided time for small group work on the "Pathways to the Future" process. Margaret Dempsey, RSM led this discussion and later prepared the written report for the Pathways Committee.

During the business meeting by a majority vote, it was agreed to modify Point 3.6 of the By-Laws (on Executive Board membership) by deleting "a majority of whom shall be Sisters of Mercy."

Since Rosann Fraher, RSM, President-Elect, and Michele Whitehead were the only remaining members for the Executive Committee and both have two years in their terms, four new members needed to be elected. The membership present at the conference also agreed that the two persons elected with the highest votes would serve a three-year term and the other two elected would serve a two-year term. Peggy Lake, RSM, and Ms. Dorothy McCrea were elected for the three-year term. Ms. Carolyn Jaworski and Mr. Michael Johnson were elected for a two-year term.

The financial statement for the 1996-97 fiscal year of the Association was reviewed and accepted..

During the liturgy on Sunday, Margaret Dempsey commissioned all the members of the Executive Board: those newly elected, Michele Whitehead as she began her second term, and Rosann Fraher, RSM, as president.

The conference concluded with Margaret Dempsey providing a report on the Institute Congress. Miss Toni Ann Secrest, MSEA's representative on the planning committee for the Institute Congress, was gratefully acknowledged. Rosann Fraher, RSM, encouraged the membership to participate in the activities of the MSEA as we direct the Association into the future.

**Conference XVII, 1998, "Tides of Change"** was held in **Savannah, Georgia**. The host school was St. Vincent's Academy. The conference participants were cordially welcomed by Sister Helen Marie Buttimer, Principal, Floyd Adams, Mayor, Paul Hinchy, CEO of St. Joseph's/Candler Health System, Sister Pat Coward, conference coordinator, and Sister Margaret Beatty, President of the Baltimore Regional Community.

Much of the conference was dedicated to outlining trends in Mercy education and to affirming the expressed desire of the group to provide support systems that will nurture and strengthen the Mercy charism in our schools into the future.

The international reality of MSEA was experienced. Administrators from Muffles College in Belize and from Colegio Santa Ethnea in Bella Vista, Argentina participated in the conference.

At the business meeting, Michele Whitehead, assistant principal of Mother McAuley High School in Chicago, became the president-elect of MSEA.

Administrators and members of Regional Community Leadership Teams met with the Sponsorship Committee on Friday prior to the opening of the MSEA Conference. As a result of meetings held the previous spring, a structure and timeline were shared with the participants.

**Conference XVIII, 1999, *Exploring Mercy Excellence*** was hosted by **Mount St. Mary Academy, Little Rock, Arkansas**. The conference welcomed 215 participants from eighteen states, Argentina, Belize, and Guam.

The conference participants were formally welcomed at the Arkansas Excelsior Hotel by Sister Deborah Troillett, RSM, President of Mount Saint Mary Academy, Dr. Mike Rockers, Superintendent, Catholic Schools of Arkansas, Jim Dailey, Mayor and his wife Patti '64, and Sister Richard Mary Burke, President of the St. Louis Regional Community.

In the opening prayer, Sr. Rosann Fraher, President of MSEA invited "the Spirit of Catherine" to come among the group. Sr. Patricia J. Corkery, RSM, from the Merion Regional Community, portrayed Catherine McAuley and shared wisdom and stories to set the tone for the evening. The evening closed with a reception in the Pinnacle Room of the hotel, sponsored by St. Joseph's Regional Health Center, Hot Springs, AR and St. Edward Mercy Medical Center, Fort Smith, AR.

On Saturday morning, the meeting opened with the keynote address by Sr. Lourdes Sheehan, RSM, Secretary for Education, US Catholic Conference. Sr. Lourdes challenged the group to identify the "essential, timeless, non-negotiable aspects that identify a school as Mercy." After lunch Carol Penner of the National Institute of Learning Disabilities, provided an overview of recent brain research and the implications for teaching and learning. She identified methods for stimulating the highest level of integrative learning for all students served in Mercy schools.

After the meeting on Saturday, conference participants took a shuttle from the hotel to Mount St. Mary Academy for an evening of entertainment. Guests were greeted at a reception sponsored by the St. Louis Regional Community. Mount Saint Mary students provided guided tours of the school. Participants were treated to a BBQ and catfish dinner in the McAuley Center, with music and country western dance lessons provided by a member of the faculty.

MSEA business included a financial report and a report on the 1999 Leadership Academy. MSEA afforded the newly formed Network for Mercy Education and its co-directors, Mary Lou Merida and Sister Corinne Raven, RSM, time and opportunity to address conference participants.

Carolyn Jaworski, Michael Johnson, and Sr. Nancy Merkle (Cincinnati) were elected to two-year Board terms.

Sister Johanna Burnell, RSM, President and Ms. Carolyn Jaworski, Principal, announced that Conference XIX would be hosted by Mercy High School, Omaha, Nebraska and a warm and musical invitation was extended to all.

Conference participants walked from the hotel to the Cathedral of St. Andrew for liturgy and the commissioning ceremony. Following the liturgy and commissioning, participants attended a brunch at McDonald Hall next door to the cathedral.

**Conference XIX, 2000**, was held in **Omaha, Nebraska** and hosted by **Mercy High School**. The quote from Daniel *“Those who instruct in the way of justice will shine like stars for all eternity,”* provided the backdrop for Conference XIX, *The Way of Justice* which focused on exploring social justice issues within the Church and within Mercy institutions. The conference hosted 180 participants. It opened Friday evening with a prayer service focusing on the six points of Social Justice: Dignity of Person, Community and the Common Good, Rights and Responsibilities, Options for the Poor, Dignity of Work, and Solidarity.

This special anniversary conference was held at the site of the first MSEA conference. It saluted the Association's past with a special program Friday evening complete with an address by Sr. Carol Wheeler. Saturday afternoon participants inserted the "*Mercy Response*" into this picture through breakout sessions grouped by people's roles within the schools. The business meetings included several new initiatives presented to the membership as well as elections for three Board Members and a President-elect. Michael Johnson, principal of Mercy Academy, Louisville was elected President-elect and Cindi Baughman, Assumption High School, Louisville and Sister Patty Moriarty, Mercy High School, Middletown, CT were elected to the MSEA Board.

The Twentieth Anniversary Conference of MSEA was held at Mercy High School ,Farmington Hills , Michigan over the October 19-21 weekend. The location, which moves annually, was most fitting as Farmington Hills was the site of the very first MSEA Conference twenty years ago. One hundred sixty attendees represented thirty-three Mercy schools from 17 states and several offshore locations.

Marking the significance of this important milestone were three MSEA initiatives that were brought to fruition. First, all past nineteen conference keynote addresses were collected into a unified compendium, "*With Fidelity*," compiled by Corinne Raven, RSM (*Network for Mercy Education - Chicago*) and given to all schools, individual members & Regional Leadership Teams.
